

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KARLA BIDI IS AN INVITATION TO PERTH FESTIVAL

From the skies to the riverways, this Fire Trail will light the night

Inspired by the Noongar tradition of lighting fires to greet and guide visitors, Karla Bidi, meaning Fire Trail, transforms the Derbarl Yerrigan | Swan River into a stunning, illuminated pathway, Fri 7 Feb -Sun 2 Mar.

For the duration of the Festival, beacons of light stretch along the river from the hills to the sea, welcoming the everyone to join in and be part of something extraordinary. These captivating beacons can be witnessed from afar or, with a journey down to the water's edge, offer an opportunity to become immersed in a unique blend of light sculptures and soundscapes designed specifically for this place.

Created by the next generation of First Nations artists, guided by Elders, each beacon is a campfire, a glowing symbol of welcome, warmth, safety and inclusivity. It is an invitation to Perth Festival. No tickets, no theatre seats – just the sky and the beautiful riverbank.

Karla Bidi is created through close collaboration between multi-disciplinary artists, Ilona McGuire, Jacob Nash, Chloe Ogilvie and Ian Wilkes and guided by Vivienne Hansen, Alta Winmar and the Perth Festival Noongar Advisory Circle.









Perth Festival Artistic Director Anna Reece says:

"At their simplest, at their core, festivals bring people together for a moment in time, creating a sense of ritual, anticipation and celebration. I wanted people in our city to walk their dogs along the river, drive across bridges, look out their windows and know Perth Festival is here and that it is for them, before they get even close to a box office.

"Karla Bidi is a beautiful gentle installation co-created by some of the next generation First Nations artists and our Elders. It celebrates the power of culture, country and community. Connecting us to each other and to where we live. A campfire trail, illuminating our river, signalling the arrival of the festival and telling us we are all welcome."

Perth Festival Artistic Associate and Karla Bidi Creative Collaborator Chloe Ogilvie says:

"Karla Bidi started from the provocation of being beacons of light along the river signalling the presence of Perth Festival and quickly evolved to become a symbol of welcome, grounded on Noongar Boodjar, and drawing inspiration from the glow of a campfire seen from a distance that draws you in and welcomes you.

"As First Nations artists it's impossible to separate our identity from the work we do. It is such a privilege to be able to weave our artistic practices and culture together so beautifully in an incredibly supportive and collaborative team, where people are free to input past the confines of their artistic practice and endeavour to push Karla Bidi beyond anything we, and Boorloo has experienced before."

Australian exclusive 12 Last Songs makes the ordinary extraordinary



12 Last Songs

What is a city but the people? Part live exhibition, part epic performance, 12 Last Songs will debut its unique and intimate theatrical experience to Australian audiences in the Heath Ledger Theatre at Perth Festival, for one show only on Sat 15 Feb.

With no intermission, real workers from Perth will perform paid shifts in front of a live audience from midday to midnight. This unusual and intriguing experience explores how we work, live and spend our time – inviting audiences to meet people they may not encounter in their everyday life.

As each new worker takes the stage, they discuss what they do and how they see the world. A decorator might paper a wall, a nail technician might apply a fresh set, a barista might serve up a coffee. Others who are unable to perform their shifts live – a sex worker, FIFO worker or shark spotter – might detail their day, framing the rhythms of the city through the people who make it work.

Over the 12 hours audience members can come and go as they please to witness a portrait of Perth created live onstage through its people in this joyful and touching work.

Perth Festival Artistic Director Anna Reece says:

"If you could explore life, the universe and everything in just one show, 12 Last Songs is it. It's raw, real, gets right to the heart of everyday life, created for and with the people of Perth. It invites us all to stop, to listen to each other and feel the power in the stories and individuals we can so easily overlook. I love that we are throwing open all the doors of our Heath Ledger Theatre for a day and letting our city and its stories flood in."











An Australian exclusive, 12 Last Songs is an extraordinary work by Manchester-based ensemble Quarantine, known around the world for their forensic interest in daily life. Quarantine has achieved international acclaim for work that is intellectually rigorous, radical in form and unique in character.

Richard Gregory, Director of 12 Last Songs and co-Artistic Director of Quarantine:

"We're thrilled to bits to be coming to Perth with 12 Last Songs, a piece of live mass portraiture. It's a project we love doing – a privilege to see a city through the people who work there - and Perth Festival is the perfect context to make this kaleidoscopic slice of society. It feels all the more vital at this moment in time to create situations that bring people together who might not usually share a space – and to acknowledge that it's our differences as much as our connections that enrich our experience."

EAST PERTH POWER STATION – LET THERE BE POWER. AND ART. AND MUSIC.

The switch is ready to be flicked as the Power Station comes alive again

In a historic move, East Perth Power Station will become Perth Festival's newest precinct, transforming the long-dormant site into the ultimate destination for hot summer nights across the duration of the Festival, Fri 7 Feb - Sun 2 Mar.

Set along the river's edge, the iconic venue will welcome the public for the first time in years, bringing fresh energy to one of Perth's most significant landmarks as it becomes the beating heart of this year's Festival celebrations.

Perth Festival Artistic Director Anna Reece says:

"Bringing the East Perth Power Station back to life with music and art is huge for Perth Festival and huge for Perth. This legendary site has been part of our cities story for generations, and now we are filling it with fresh energy, music and incredible art transforming it into a space that for a month every summer will become a cultural heartbeat for our city."

Every Wednesday to Sunday afternoon, the Power Station comes alive with Casa Musica, a vibrant celebration of music, food and culture inspired by the lively piazzas and parks of southern Europe. This free event promises world-class performances from across the Indian Ocean rim and beyond, featuring acts from Réunion Island, South Africa, India and Italy.

Casa Musica invites visitors to unwind by the river, savour local food and drinks, and dance the evening away to a diverse line-up of international and local talent.

When the sun sets, the façade of the Power Station will serve as a spectacular backdrop for an ambitious art commission featuring projected works from three Noongar artists: Allan Yarran, Ilona





McGuire and Daniel Hansen . Each night, the walls come alive as they become a canvas for **Boorloo Contemporary**, an electrifying new celebration of Indigenous artists.

After dark, a hidden corner of the Power Station will transform into a Main Stage for experimental, electronic and live music, promising an unforgettable experience in this monumental industrial setting. Inspired by iconic venues like London's Printworks, the space will retain its industrial grit, with steel beams and a cavernous dancefloor.

It all kicks off with a powerful all First Nations opening night line-up headlined by the multi-awardwinning electronic duo, Electric Fields. The main stage line-up continues German pianist, composer, producer and celebrated performer Nils Frahm for two enticingly hypnotic nights; Midnight Oil's legendary frontman Peter Garrett & The Alter Egos in a rare solo performance fuelled by power and passion; Alter Boy performing their entire catalogue of self-described 'queerlectro pop noir'; one of the most enduring electronic acts of our time, Norwegian duo Röyksopp for a very special DJ set from beyond the Arctic Circle; a kaleidoscopic mash-up of African and electronic elements by Ibibio Sound Machine fronted by Nigerian singer Eno Williams; Egyptian-Australian DJ Moktar, renowned for mixing house and techno music with traditional Arabic instrumentation; and C.FRIM who will throw down blends of rap, afrobeat, dancehall and grime with esoteric house, techno and everything in between.

Deputy Premier and Minister for Tourism Rita Saffioti says:

"The East Perth Power Station is an amazing site with so much history and it will be open to the public as a key part of the Perth Festival 2025. It's going to be incredible and of course, in the future, a great tourism icon."

The complete main stage line-up will be revealed in December, with all main stage performances requiring tickets.

CELEBRATING THE INNOVATION AND AMBITION OF ABORIGINAL AND **FIRST NATIONS ARTISTS**

Major new initiative of genre-defying, cutting edge artworks in **Boorloo Contemporary**

A new initiative of Perth Festival, Boorloo Contemporary is a commissioning and development stream fostering genre-defying, cutting edge artworks that connect with tradition and anticipate the future. Shaped by a group of First Nations curators and arts leaders, it will present immersive works that explore light, sound, ceremony, storytelling, and relationships between new and old technologies.

Launching Boorloo Contemporary is an illuminated commission for the iconic East Perth Power Station. The Power Station Commission will be an annual presentation by an artist, or artists, of a large-scale work responding to the power station and its surrounds. In 2025, new work by Noongar artists Allan Yarran, Ilona McGuire and Daniel Hansen visually speak to the history of the site in colour, record and poem.

Killa: Pindan to Plate, a provocative 'nose-to-tail' west Kimberley feast and ambitious solo exhibitions from Alice Guiness and Mervyn Street also feature in the inaugural Boorloo Contemporary program at different locations across Perth.

When the sun sets, the façade of the Power Station will serve as a spectacular backdrop for an ambitious art commission featuring projected works from three Yarran, Ilona McGuire and Daniel Hansen. Each night, the walls come alive as they become a canvas for Boorloo Contemporary.

In a unique dining experience, guests will share in the narratives and cultural food practices from the west Kimberley coast in Killa: Pindan to Plate. This incredibly powerful commission is a literal visual feast, at The Rechabite Hall.

Co-created with a team of First Nations artists led by Chad Creighton and Emilia Galatis, Killa: Pindan to Plate explores how introduced species have become part of the Kimberley diet. Throughout the evening, while an immersive film work documents the preparation of 'Killa' cattle for consumption, guests will be offered eight very special dishes prepared by head chef of the Double Rainbow kitchen, Navarre Top.

This 'nose-to-tail' dining event pulls back the curtain to a lifestyle that is conscious of food sustainability and eating practices that exist alongside living on Country.

See, hear and feel Yindjibarndi Ngurra through vibrations of light and sound that teach the song cycle of birds, animals, plants, hills, water places, the stars and the moon in Alice Guiness' Burndud Ground at John Curtin Gallery.

A senior artist, Alice holds a deep connection with the Burndud, an important site and story for the Yindjibarndi people. Each stroke of the Burndud circle in Alice's paintings tells a story and it is through her special connection with Yinjibarndi ceremony that Alice – who lives with disability – shares herself with the world.

Alice's Burndud paintings have become iconic across the Pilbara – her use of bold colour and patterns embody the rhythms and movement of the women dancing and the men singing in Ceremony. Now these works will be celebrated and shared with Festival audiences, brought to life in neon sculpture and immersive media installations.

Kimberley Country, its beauty and the harsh realities of cattle work there, are brought to life in Stolen Wages, a vibrant collection by Gooniyandi Elder and artist Mervyn Street at Fremantle Arts Centre.

With his vivid memory and natural talent for capturing movement and colour, Mervyn shares his life, Country and history of his family in paintings, drawings, carvings and animations that reveal love, struggle and triumph. Stolen Wages features newly commissioned paintings that continue Mervyn's legacy of telling truth to power, following his historic court victory over the State Government for decades of wages stolen from the cattle workers of the Kimberley. The exhibition will also feature important canvases that played an important role in his court victory.

Perth Festival Artistic Director Anna Reece says:

"Boorloo Contemporary is a major new initiative for Perth Festival. An annual commissioning project, providing transformative, immersive experiences from artists who are facilitating the most important conversations of our time. It will lead with First Nations works from home to connect with like-minded artists in South East Asia/Asia-Pacific, considering what 'First Nations' culture means in our region."

POWER STATION SERVES AS BLANK CANVAS TO INSPIRE, EVOKE & REFLECT

Annual art commission for Perth Festival will profile emerging First Nations artists

Transforming Perth Festival's latest arts precinct will be the new annual project East Perth Power Station Commission, illuminating the dormant site into a kaleidoscope of colour and expression during the Festival Fri 7 Feb - Sun 2 Mar.

The Power Station Commission will ask an artist, or artists, to create a large-scale work responding to the power station and its surrounds, presenting immersive works that defy genre, exploring light, sound, ceremony, storytelling, and relationships between new and old technologies. These works will be a beacon for visitors, shaping the visual identity of the Festival experience in East Perth and forming the heart of the **Boorloo Contemporary** program.

In 2025, commissions by Noongar artists Allan Yarran, Ilona McGuire and Daniel Hansen will speak to the history of the site in living colour and poetry.

Allan Yarran is a prolific painter of Noongar vistas, with a palpable love of Country and connection to land. Leaping off the canvas, Allan's brightly coloured depictions and reflections of places akin to WA's Southwest draw on his personal memories. In collaboration with new media artist Sam Price, his work will be brought to life as large psychedelic projections of his paintings onto East Perth Power Station. These high contrast and mesmerising visuals are a window into the history of the Derbal Yerrigan.

Multidicplinary artist Ilona McGuire is heavily influenced by the social impacts of Australian colonisation, where her art consistently finds new ways of expressing community frustrations, hopes and depth. The Bibbulmun Noongar and Kungarakan artist will utilise archival material, colourful patterning and layers of





intersecting collages to unpack history and create opportunities for forward-thinking in her commission for Boorloo Contemporary.

Daniel Murray Hansen is an early career poet and part of the next generation of Noongar writers. Reflections of place, explorations of kinship and contemplations of Country are thematic throughout his work. Daniel will vocalise the special place poetry and language hold for many Noongar people, transforming the Power Station into a billboard for the hopes, dreams and ambitions of Noongar people. His work will create an inspiring space for reflection that includes the voices of local Elders.

Perth Festival Artistic Director Anna Reece says: "The Boorloo Contemporary program will provide transformative, immersive experiences from artists who are facilitating the most important conversations of our time. It will lead with First Nations works from home to connect with likeminded artists in South East Asia/Asia-Pacific, considering what 'First Nations' culture means in our region."

Perth Festival Creative Producer Yabini Kickett says: "Each Artist represents a different area of culture and expertise; together they weave connection to place, spirit and beauty for the wider community of Boorloo to experience."

Its curation is guided by a curatorium made up of Clotilde Bullen, Chad Creighton, Glenn Iseger-Pilkington and Chloe Ogilvie, supported by Creative Producer Yabini Kickett and Producer Gemma Weston.








BURNDUD NEON SCULPTURE AND IMMERSIVE INSTALLATIONS

Share in the rich Yindjibarndi culture in major new Alice Guiness commission

See, hear and feel Yindjibarndi Ngurra through vibrations of light and sound that teach the Burndud song cycle of birds, animals, plants, hills, water places, the stars and the moon. This new commission of work from Elder Alice Guiness at John Curtin Gallery for Perth Festival, Fri 7 Feb -Sun 20 Apr is part of the Festival's major new initiative, Boorloo Contemporary.

A senior artist, Alice holds a deep connection with the Burndud, an important site and story for the Yindjibarndi people. Each stroke of the Burndud circle tells a story and it is through her special connection that Alice – who lives with a disability that limits her speaking – shares herself with the world.

Alice's Burndud paintings have become iconic across the Pilbara – her use of bold colour and patterns embody the rhythms and movement of the women dancing and the men singing in Ceremony. Now these works will be celebrated and shared with Festival audiences, brought to life in neon sculpture and immersive media installations.

Perth Festival Artistic Director Anna Reece says:









"It is an honour to be commissioning Alice Guiness together with John Curtin Gallery as one of four major works within our inaugural Boorloo Contemporary. Alice's new work will bring to life the sites and stories of the Yindjibarndi people in immersive non-traditional mediums."

Alice has been painting since the 1990s, joining various art groups around Roebourne. She paints the same subject repeatedly, selecting different colour patterns to express her feelings and connection to her Ngurra (country).

Killa: Pindan to Plate leads diners on the journey of the 'killa', Kimberley cattle taken straight from the bush and shared amongst families. Complimented by an opulent long table set with custom designs by regional WA artists, this immersive dining experience comes to life through video installations and projections.

Co-created with a team of First Nations artists led by Chad Creighton and Emilia Galatis, Killa: Pindan to Plate explores how introduced species have become part of the Kimberley diet. Throughout the evening, guests will be offered eight very special dishes prepared by head chef of the Double Rainbow kitchen, Navarre Top.

Perth Festival Artistic Director Anna Reece says:

"Killa: Pindan to Plate is a modern statement about contemporary Australia, global issues and parallel histories. You are invited to journey through a West Kimberly way of life where culture, food preparation and Country are celebrated despite the difficult history of the pastoral frontier.

"This is not a story being told; it is a reality being shared. We are very proud to have commissioned this extraordinary work as part of our inaugural Boorloo Contemporary this year."

Meryn Street's paintings reveal more about the history of Gooniyandi's Stolen Wages history as part of BOORLOO CONTEMPORARY

Kimberley Country, its beauty and the harsh realities of cattle work there, are brought to life in a vibrant collection by Gooniyandi Elder and artist Mervyn Street in a Perth Festival commission at Walyalup | Fremantle Arts Centre, Fri 7 Feb - Sun 20 Apr as part of Boorloo Contemporary, a major new commissioning initiative at Perth Festival.

With his vivid memory and natural talent for capturing movement and colour, Mervyn shares his life, Country and history of his family in paintings, drawings, carvings and animations that reveal love, struggle and triumph. Stolen Wages features newly commissioned paintings that continue Mervyn's legacy of telling truth to power, following his historic court victory over the State Government for decades of wages stolen from the cattle workers of the Kimberley.

Mervyn is a Gooniyandi man, from one of the two river groups from the country around Fitzroy Crossing. He is an accomplished illustrator, carver and painter, and author of Know Your Granny about his country and his language. He also co-produced the book At The River.

"While very well known for his relentless advocacy on behalf of his people, Mervyn Street is one of Western Australia's most important artists. We are so thrilled to be commissioning a new series of paintings from Mervyn, shown alongside important works from his history as an artist and activist, documenting a long career of telling truth to power.

EAST MEETS WEST MEETS PERTH – A MODERN RETELLING OF AN ANCIENT EPIC

Once-in-a-generation theatrical experience Mahabharata to enthral Perth in Australian exclusive

Blending classic tropes of royal rivalries, feuding families and bloody vengeance, *Mahabharata* is a visually stunning two-part theatrical experience making its Australian debut at His Majesty's Theatre for Perth Festival, Sat 8 - Sun 16 Feb.

A story told for more than 4,000 years, shared in Indian households around the world, Mahabharata takes an ancient Sanskrit poem about dynasties vying for control of a kingdom and turns it into an unforgettable and epic event.

Meet the Pandavas and the Kauravas – two royal families fighting for control of the kingdom their grandfather once ruled. It's a tale as old as Homer's Odyssey or as recent as TV's Succession.

This large-scale contemporary retelling from Canada's Why Not Theatre stars a cast entirely from the South Asian diaspora, brought to life by a hypnotic live soundtrack of classical Indian music and dance, and woven together by the ultimate storyteller.

The production is split into two parts; Karma - The Life We Inherit, which begins Mahabharata's epic journey that asks, "When everyone believes they are right and their opponents wrong, how can one end a spiral of revenge?", and Dharma - The Life We Choose which explores the question "In times of division, how do we find wholeness? Are we destined to repeat the mistakes of our ancestors? Can we build a new world?"

Throughout the experience the production undergoes an evolution in storytelling – from the most ancient - a storyteller around a fire - to a contemporary and technologically-integrated spectacle of projections, dynamic digital soundscapes and poetic stage design.





Mahabharata is a story that one learns over a lifetime; it needs to be absorbed and digested. Perth audiences who wish to be carried further by the storytelling are invited to experience the Khana & Kahani: Community Meal and Storytelling Session. Hosted by two charming storytellers, the audience experiences a tale from the Mahabharata as many people have, around the dinner table and over a delicious Indian meal.

Deceptively simple, Larsen C is a breathtaking display of art in movement that speaks to the fierceness of life and fluidity of form.

Perth Festival Artistic Director Anna Reece says:

"This is a mesmerising and intoxicating work that explores the unknown territories of space and the body. The choreography is exquisite, hypnotic to watch and I am deeply thrilled to be welcoming Christos Papadopoulous to Australia for the first time."

Born in a small village in the Peloponnese region of Greece, Christos studied dance and choreography at the School for New Dance Development (SNDO) in Amsterdam. His distinctive choreographic style stands out for its highly developed visual-art dimension; the close relationship between bodies and spaces, and movements and music.

RHYTHM, ENERGY AND REBELLION TAKE CENTRE STAGE CARCAÇA's diverse cast explore cultural identity through joyous dance

Rhythm, energy and rebellion will explode in a cacophony of urban dance and folklore for an Australian exclusive season of CARCAÇA at Heath Ledger Theatre, Fri 7 - Sun 9 Feb.

Directing a crew of ten diverse performers, Portuguese choreographer Marco da Silva Ferreira's CARCAÇA explores identity through an intuitive and unpretentious flow of the body. Each new step is complex but made with simple sneakers and complimented live on stage by drums (João Pais Filipe) and electronic music (Luis Pestana).

These elements constitute an accelerated soundtrack that interconnects references from traditional music, postmodern music and club music. Beginning with steps familiar from street dance, clubbing and hip-hop battles, the dancing intensifies, accelerating into wild, euphoric movement that connects with the legacy and memory of dances from the past.

Dive into the diverse mix of art on offer for Perth Festival 2025

Cultural connections, family ties and the bonds that shape our identity are conversations and concepts that run through the **Exhibitions Program** for Perth Festival 2025.

Hosted in galleries across Perth and Fremantle, this year's artists offer a mix of mediums and performance art to engage with - from VR and audio-visual installations, to painted vistas and photography, as well as rich clay sculptures and pottery.

DADAA will host prolific young Martu artist Judith Anya Samson and her latest work Anya's Puntawarri World, which takes this world beyond the canvas and into an immersive multi-media experience.

Walyalup | Fremantle Arts Centre welcomes new work from celebrated Australian artists Kate Mitchell and Dianne Jones. Kate Mitchell's Idea Induction is an immersive series of works that ask the question: where do ideas come from? While acclaimed Ballardong Noongar artist Dianne Jones brings the witty and humorous style of her photographic works Sunbaker and Beach Scene to a new suite of images.

Venture on a journey into the heart of family, culture and tradition at Fremantle's PS Art Space, with Australian Zambian ceramicist Shupiwe Chongwe's Bedforms. This deeply personal reflection on the connections that bind us is rich in emotion and includes a blend of sculpture and photography.

The visions of eight Western Australian artists will be coming together at West Perth's Holmes à Court Gallery to express their response to the WA landscape. Drylands portrays canola fields in full bloom, dry, lone trees and empty scarred landscapes - highlighting our land in peril.

Another group exhibition de-centre re-centre focuses on the strength and diversity of contemporary photography in Australia. Held at the Lawrence Wilson Art Gallery, more than 10 artists will navigate the politics of visibility using a range of diverse photography practices to explore place, community and identity.

Artist, academic and storyteller Mai Nguyễn-Long will share her latest series of clay forms in the Doba Nation exhibition along-side her iconic large-scale 'Vomit Girl' sculptures at John Curtin Gallery. The Vietnamese Australian artist uses brushwork that borrows from the southern Vietnamese folk religious motifs merged with personalised symbols, ultimately inviting us to interrogate the history of our own identity.

Embrace a rich and interlinked program at Perth Institute of Contemporary Arts where artists have created works celebrating the inspiration of women. A labyrinth of immersive audio-visual installations has taken over PICA's ground floor courtesy of French artist Laure Prouvost, whose piece Oui Move In You features a trilogy of works that lead you through the roles and legacies of grandmothers. Matriarchal themes continue for In Her Footsteps – collaborative work by seven artists that pays homage to the women who have shaped their lives.

Perth Institute of Contemporary Arts and Perth Festival will also welcome the Australian premiere of Biraddali Dancing on the Horizon. The latest moving image work from Australian-Filipina artist Bhenji Ra, in collaboration with her Tausug mentor, the piece takes you on a dream-like journey into ancestral and intergenerational learning.

Presented by FORM, Happy Meals and Scooter Skids: art from the outer suburbs has been developed by Rockingham-based artist and educator Andy Quilty, in collaboration with students from three of Perth's outer suburban high schools. A dynamic and celebratory exploration of outersuburban life, the exhibition aims to amplify under-represented stories, improve arts access for outer-suburban communities, and develop awareness among participating young people of the possibility of pursuing the arts into the future.

At Subiaco Art Centre, an exhibition drawing from the archive of one of Western Australia's most important creative and cultural practitioners – Noongar Elder Richard Walley – offers a window into the history of the Middar Dance Group. Presented in partnership with Yirra Yarkin Theatre Company, and curated by Alton and Rickeeta Walley, Middar Koora ba ye (Middar long ago and today) includes photographs, objects and stories about a group that have welcomed some of the world's biggest stars (including Kiss, Harry Styles and Stevie Wonder), to Noongar Boodjar. The exhibition opens as part of the annual Yirra Yarkin Family Picnic and includes weekly dance performances.


